ROAR Loud n Live

The final ROAR event for the current group was a major success, with over 100 folk squeezing into Orkney Sailing Club for their 'Loud n Live' gig.

This was a collaboration between the 14 young folk involved in this year's VAO group and local rock festival organisers Live Wire. The hope is that this connection will encourage young people to 'graduate' to helping with the rock event, in the same way that such healthy numbers are involved with the folk festival.

On the night, three acts of school age were given their chance alongside more established Orkney rockers, making for a varied and exciting night of old favourites and new discoveries.



Nacho Heap, made entirely of ROAR group members performed original material and were warmly received by the crowd. Charlie Wallhead and AIN - all S5 pupils at KGS - gave strong performances as well.

They raised a total of £930 for provision of mental health services and suicide awareness for young people in Orkney. The money will be shared between KGS and Stromness Academy.

2015 Stromness Academy Life Skills / West Mainland Day Centre Memories Project



Third year pupils at Stromness Academy recently teamed up with VAO for a memories project with the folks at the West Mainland Day Centre.

The first few weeks were spent learning interview skills and preparing questions. Then it was off to Stenness for an afternoon of blethers, tea and cake.

The young folk took their recorded interviews back to the Academy and chose various areas of personal interest to base projects on. They spent a few weeks gathering information and researching on various aspects of life in the 1940s.

Finally, at the end of term, the folks from the Day Centre visited the Academy and had a tour of the lecture theatre, turned into a 1940s exhibition for the day, and to see the pupils receiving their volunteering awards.



Welfare Reform Project Update



A few months ago we told you about a new service we were just about to launch to support clients in Orkney to complete online applications for benefits (universal credit). We've been really busy over the past month or so, and thought we would update you with the progress.

In partnership with Orkney CAB, we have recruited and trained 4 volunteers, developed project paperwork and a referral process and we're currently contacting various

partners and potential referral agencies.

We will have IT equipment based in both Kirkwall and Stromness Libraries and The Pickaquooy Centre. This means that volunteers and clients will be able to meet outwith regular office hours to complete their online application.

Resourcing Scotland's Heritage

Resourcing Scotland's Heritage (RSH) provides inspiration and practical advice to help heritage organisations maximise results from their fundraising. With local training from the experts and support from peers, Resourcing Scotland's Heritage provides everything you need to know about successful fundraising from private sources including individuals, businesses and private charitable trusts.

The three year training programme, funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund, is now well underway with over 25 events delivered so far. Sessions include:

- 'Make it Happen' - an introduction to fundraising from private sources
- 'Planning to Progress' - a fundraising strategy development course
- 'In Focus' - a series of events focussed on one aspect of fundraising from private sources such as: Legacies; Friends and Membership; Case for Support; Annual Giving; Researching Trusts on a Shoestring; Applying to Trusts & Foundations; Introduction to Sponsorship; and Crowdfunding.

The programme is open to all working and volunteering in heritage including:

- Projects in green spaces and urban environments
- Historic buildings and environment
- Archaeology
- Museums, galleries and heritage venues
- Voluntary and community groups working within heritage

Building quality in rural Scotland

Are you interested in your local community hall? Are you a volunteer on the committee or happy volunteering at events, keeping up the maintenance or brewing tea and making home bakes (VERY important!)? Then you might be interested in [KeyStone](#).

KeyStone is a quality award and management toolkit for the people who manage village halls and community buildings. It provides checklists and resources to help you manage your building.

KeyStone is an entirely voluntary quality award and management system that will help strengthen your organisation. Unlike other quality awards it's been designed specifically for organisations running community facilities like village halls, community centres, youth and heritage centres. It provides comprehensive supporting resources and a mentor to help and encourage you.

Undertaking the Keystone Award will help you to:

- ensure you meet all necessary legal and regulatory requirements for running your building
- organise your files, documents and information to make life easier for you and future committees
- provide evidence to others that you run a well-managed facility
- secure a long term future for your facility
- understand where to go for help
- have confidence that you're doing things right

Chance to be heard for Scots who spent time in care as children

Scots who spent time in institutional care as children can have their experiences heard and acknowledged by taking part in the National Confidential Forum.



The independent body is inviting participants from across Scotland to come forward and share their experiences, whatever they are, in a safe and non-judgemental setting.

The testimonies of participants will help the Forum understand what happened to children in the past and show what can be done to make things safer for children in care, today and in the future.

Project manager, Ben Lukins, said, 'If you have been in institutional care as a child in Scotland, this is your chance to be heard. Sharing experiences can be therapeutic and importantly, the information given by participants will contribute to making positive changes to children in care today and in the future.'

Anyone who spent time in institutional care as a child can come to the Forum. They must be over 16 years old and no longer in care. Institutional care means residential care or the health service. The service could be run by a local authority, health board, a private provider or a charity and can include: a children's home; a short or long term hospital stay in a children's ward; a residential unit; a boarding school at public or private school; a school trip or summer school.

Set up in August 2014, the Forum is an independent body, funded by Scottish Ministers and hosted by the Mental Welfare Commission for Scotland. It started taking applications and holding hearings last month. The Forum is expected to run until August 2017.
