## Local News & Events

### The Big Charity Do

The Big Charity Do took place in The Albert hotel on 31 July. Organised by The VAO ROAR group, the young

volunteers raised £688 to be shared between Crossroads Orkney and the Orkney Island Games Association. Many young volunteers also performed on the night, with

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### ‘Future-proofing’ the Neolithic Archaeology Galleries

Orkney Museum has recently launched a new project that will pilot the redesign of the interpretation and display in the Neolithic galleries. Orkney Islands Council would like to gather feedback from locals and visitors on the current display of its world-renowned Stone-Age artefacts and discover what they would like to see being developed.

It has been 30 years since the Neolithic galleries at Orkney Museum were last updated. Since then Archaeological excavations and research have led to significant changes in understand-



ing about Stone-Age life in Orkney, launching the Islands onto the world stage of Archaeological discovery.

Jenn Allison is the Museum’s recently-appointed Archaeology Project Officer. She said: “We want displays to be able to reflect the amazing developments and discoveries to date, and to enable up to date stories well into the future, in a way that really engages our visitors.

“We would really like to

know what local people think of the current Neolithic Archaeology galleries at the Museum and what they’d like to see included as part of the improvements.”

From the end of August and throughout September, Jenn will be conducting market research surveys to gather the thoughts and opinions of local people and visitors, including an online survey.

As part of this, she will be travelling with the Orkney Islands Council Library van service as well as conducting interviews in Kirkwall and Stromness town centres in coming weeks.

She also hopes to hold several focus groups to discuss in greater detail the poten-

tial developments of the new Neolithic galleries with local people who have a keen interest.

The online survey is available on the Council homepage [www.orkney.gov.uk](http://www.orkney.gov.uk), along with details of the dates and locations of Jenn's interview sessions in the isles and in Kirkwall and Stromness.

### Community Planning Improvement Programme

VAO has been chosen as one of five Third Sector Interfaces (TSIs) to pilot the Community Planning Improvement Programme (CPIP). CPIP is funded by Scottish Govern-

ment and led by Voluntary Action Scotland and the Improvement Service.

The programme will involve a self-assessment process to a) improve TSI (ie VAO) and third sector engagement with community planning and b) to

develop tools and techniques that can be used to support the remaining 27 TSIs to undertake the programme in 2015-16.

The first part of the process will be to gather information from all community planning partners,

including third sector organisations, which when analysed will identify those areas that we need to work on. Around the beginning of September the Improvement Service will send all partners, including VAO members and Third Sector Forum members, an online 'check list'. It is quite comprehensive and will take approximately one hour to complete so help is on hand if needed. The survey is anonymous and analysis will be carried out by the Improve-

ment Service. Once results have been compiled meetings will be held in Orkney to decide priorities and to agree by the end of December an improvement plan. From January to March 2015 the plan will be implemented and progress monitored. All partners will be kept informed and involved throughout the process.

This is an exciting opportuni-

ty to improve joint working between VAO, the third sector and Community Planning. VAO is currently recruiting a development worker to help to deliver the programme in Orkney, see Job Opportunities on page 5 for more details or visit the VAO [website](#).

## Funding & Finance

### The Funders are coming!

### Scottish Water: Charity Exemption Scheme

Earlier this month the Scottish Government agreed the Scottish Water Exemption Scheme for the period 2015-21. Broadly speaking, the Scheme will exempt, subject to certain conditions, all charities and community amateur sports clubs with annual incomes of less than £200,000 from the payment of water and sewerage charges. Those with incomes between £200,000 and £300,000 will receive a 50% discount on their wholesale charges. For those charities set to lose their current exemption as a consequence of the changes, a two year transition period will be put in place. We will bring you more information on the Scheme when available from the Scottish Government.

### Childcare for Children of Benefit Recipients- Confirmation of Benefits

From August 2014, the Scottish Government is providing 600 hours per year (the equivalent of 16 hours per week) early learning and childcare provision for certain categories of children. One of the key priorities of the change is to support parents to work, train, study or provide opportunities for employment.

One of the key areas that impact is the introduction of support for 2 year olds where a parent is in receipt of a benefit, as Local Authorities will need confirmation that applicants are in receipt of one of these benefits.

A simple process has been agreed whereby applicants (claimants) will produce, to Job Centre Plus, a generic proforma, indicating which of the qualifying benefits they receive. Job Centre Plus will confirm this and then sign, date stamp and office stamp the proforma before returning it to the claimant to present to their local authority or childcare provider. ## Historic Scotland funding for the voluntary sector



The voluntary sector is recognised as a fundamental part of Scottish society and a varied list of organisations have long provided crucial support to the Scottish government in its efforts to con-

serve the historic environment. The provision of grants to voluntary bodies are an essential part of Historic Scotland's wider efforts to safeguard Scotland's historic environment and promote its understanding and enjoyment.

Voluntary Sector Organisations that provide services or input to the Historic Environment Sector are invited to apply for funding. Applica-

tions for funding assistance must be submitted by 30 September each year and are appraised against Historic Scotland's agreed priorities. The very first [Scottish Rural Parliament](#) will be taking place later this year in Oban, Argyll & Bute. The three day event, from 6 – 8 November, will bring together 400 decision-makers, organisa-

tions and people from rural communities across Scotland. The Rural Parliament will produce a shared vision for rural Scotland with identified actions to be taken at community, regional, national and EU level, whilst celebrating the strengths and achievements of rural communities.

Unlike most Parliaments, a Rural Parliament is a bottom-up process of discussion and debate which anyone can participate in, rather than people being elected to represent other people's views. This is our chance to make sure Orkney's views are heard and we would encourage as many people as possible to attend.

## Job Opportunities at VAO

### Support Worker – Connect Project

35 Hours. The Project Support Worker will work closely with the Co-ordinator to devise and deliver a range of individual learning opportunities, volunteer placements and routes to employment.

### Outreach Worker – Connect Project

14 Hours. This post requires an experienced, flexible and motivated person to design and deliver an intensive 1 to 1 Person Centred Programme, delivered initially

with an outreach approach, to young people aged 16-19, who are not in employment, education or training.

### Development Worker – Community Planning and Engagement

35 Hours. The Community Development Improvement Programme is being led by Voluntary Action Scotland and the improvement Service and is funded by Scottish Government. This one year post will assist VAO to develop and implement a community development improvement plan

to ensure that the third sector and the wider community is effectively engaged with and involved in community planning.

## Volunteering Opportunities

### Mentoring training

An opportunity has arisen for mentoring training (SMN Mentoring Qualification), to be offered to six people in Orkney in October this year by the Wise Group's PSP programme. Thereafter the trained mentors will be contracted on a 'spot purchase' basis to deliver a support service to young men returning to Orkney from custody. The training will be offered free of charge.

### Adult Befriending Project – Time Limited Support

In November 2013, Voluntary Action Orkney successfully added a new strand to their Adult Befriending Service. As well as delivering one to one, community and intergenerational befriending sessions, the Service now provides support to older people either on their return from a hospital stay, or to enable them to remain in their own home, without the need to go into hospital. This service is delivered by a team of trained and dedicated volunteers.

The roll out of this strand of the Befriending Service has been a real success and the impact on the people who

have benefited from it is clearly evident:

*".....Everybody's visit is a help when you first come home from hospital, though I don't mind being on my own you don't like to ask too much from family and neighbours...."*

*".....It gave me time to settle back in at home and helped till other things were organised like a home help and the daycentre....."*

*".....Just having someone to speak to was the best thing of the lot....."*

This partnership project, funded by the Change Fund, liaises closely with Orkney Health and Care and other statutory and third sector colleagues to ensure the ser-

vice meets the needs of each individual.

Jacqueline Dennison, Support Worker, said: "We help to bridge the gap between hospital and home, increasing individuals' confidence to remain in their home or to return home. The service

provides two weeks of daily visits starting on the day of a person's discharge from hospital, ensuring that their home is prepared, providing practical support and social contact. The service relies on volunteers so I am very keen to hear from anyone who is

interested in volunteering for this valued service."
