A message from the Orkney Foodbank

In our first year we have been surprised and saddened by the demand for the Foodbank in Orkney. We always knew there was a need but we had no idea just how great that need was. Since we opened 8.4 tonnes of food, toiletries and other household essentials has been donated. This has come in all different amounts from one child bringing us a tin of spaghetti hoops bought from her own pocket money, the Tesco permanent collection point and schools, brownies and churches undertaking Harvest Collections being a few of the examples of the amazing generosity from the people of Orkney.

Over the last 12 months 267 vouchers have been redeemed and we have redistributed 5.7 tonnes of donations to 473 people. The main reason for



food poverty with our clients is low income.

We offer a service throughout Orkney, islands included! All we ask is that representatives of the mainland clients collect the allocation from the Foodbank at 18 Junction Road, Kirkwall. Any clients on the isles who require our help can have their boxes delivered via the local Foodbank co-ordinator on the island. Age Concern is a registered voucher issuer and should be

the first point of contact for people needing our assistance.

The Foodbank is open Tuesday and Friday 10am and 4pm. We have our new baked tattie wagon serving hot baked potatoes between 12 and 2pm on the days we are open. Our friendly volunteers also enjoy a cuppa and a chat with anyone popping in whether to bring in a voucher or just have a bit of company! Contact us on 07719 293378.

Court Support - showing witnesses around court before their trial and providing support in the Witness Room, supporting Special Measures.

Scottish Rural Parliament call for action

Scotland's first Rural Parliament closed with a call for action to achieve a more empowered, connected and sustainable rural Scotland. Over 400 delegates gathered in Oban for the three-day event, discussing a range of rural issues with local democracy and a need to bring power closer to the communities emerging as a strong theme throughout. An overwhelming majority of participants agreed in the final session that the Rural Parliament should continue. Applications to The Culture Fund 2015-16

The Culture Fund is managed on behalf of Orkney Islands Council by the Arts, Museums and Heritage Service within Education, Leisure & Housing.

Cultural activity, including the delivery of festivals, museums, heritage centres and arts projects, brings significant publicity and additional visitors to Orkney, as well as enabling residents to access the highest quality cultural events and activities.

Funding from the Culture Fund is allocated by the Council on an annual basis, via an open application process. This fund will support cultural organisations for their general running costs

as well as specific elements, e.g. educational or community based activities. The fund will also support non-cultural organisations for cultural elements of their programmes or activities.

Top ten financial issues facing charities

The Community Toolkit this month highlighted the top ten financial issues currently facing charities. Jandy Stevenson, partner with Henderson Loggie, said: "Those in the third sector are continuing to face mounting challenges as they strive to do their very best to assist the causes they support. The word austerity is still very prevalent when matters concerning the charity sector are raised and the likelihood of ongoing restrictions being imposed on public sector spending means that the burden being borne by many charities will probably in-

crease rather than decrease. However, by recognising where the key challenges lie it is possible to prioritise actions and optimise available resources."

The top ten issues identified are: New SORPS (Statement of Recommended Practice); Operating a charity trading subsidiary; Managing risk; Avoiding conflict of interest; Ensuring delegation processes are fit for purpose; Determining the appropriate level of reserves; Fraud; Auto-enrolment; Gift Aid; VAT.

Shared parental leave and pay

Shared parental leave will enable eligible mothers, fathers, partners and adopters to choose how to share time off work after their child is born or placed for adoption. This could mean that the mother or adopter shares some of their leave with their partner, perhaps returning to work for part of the time and then resuming leave at a later date.

It is designed to give parents more flexibility in how to care for their child in the first year following birth or adoption. Parents will be able to share a pot of leave and can decide to be off work at the same time and/or take it in turns to have periods of leave to look after the child.

The regulations are due to come into force on 1 Decem-

ber 2014. The options to use the new Shared Parental Leave rights will apply for parents who meet the eligibility criteria, where a baby is due to be born on or after 5 April 2015.
